

he season of "May," which is named for the roman goddess Maia, who was responsible for the growth of plants, is rightly filled with life moments. In addition to celebrating our "Mothers" (as we were planted in the nurturing soil

of their wombs,) we celebrate other life growing moments, like: Confirmation, Graduations, and many Weddings. May is a time to celebrate life itself!

Celebrating life is an important reminder for us all as we move through the Easter season and then enter the next chapter of our spiritual lives with Pentecost, on May 28th. This year, Pentecost is celebrated on the same weekend as Memorial Day. Let that sink in? Pentecost and Memorial Day.

In the Jewish tradition, Pentecost or Shavuot (in Hebrew) occurs 50 days after the Passover, and it is a time for Jewish families to gather and celebrate the time when Moses went up the mountain to receive the Ten Commandments. This

was the reason why the disciples of Jesus were gathered in Jerusalem 50 days after his death and resurrection—to celebrate Shavuot. On the day of Pentecost, the Spirit descended on the followers of Jesus like tongues of fire. The


Spirit gave them the power to speak the gospel in all languages so that all may know the blessing of eternal life in Christ.

Pentecost and Memorial Day are reminders of the power of the Spirit to transform our lives for service to God, and to remember the cost of freedom. People died that we might live in freedom. Jesus died so that we could have eternal life, and our brother's and sister's died on battlefields so that

we would have the freedom to gather to either praise God or not.

Just as it was for the followers of Christ, who were gifted with the power of the Spirit, we are also gifted with the power of freedom because of the sacrifices made in the cause of liberty. I

In both instances, people died that we might live.

The Disciples served as soldiers of the cross of Jesus, and lost their lives in the process, so that we would have the knowledge of eternal life in Christ. Like the women and men who served our nation and died in the process, we must honor them by doing our part to plant the seeds of liberty and freedom in Christ.

May is a month to not only celebrate the gift and joy of life itself, but to remember and honor the many who suffered that we might have life.

Happy Mother's Day! Happy Pentecost! And may we all remember with gratitude *the cost paid* for our freedom.

And you know the way to the place where I am going." Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him." Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves.

Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it.

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

Hello, my name is Brian Schieferstein,

The Church records list my great great grandparents as members around the time of the founding of St. Peter's Evangelical Church. I have been coming to St. Peter's regularly since I was a small child and became a member when confirmed in 1973. I was baptized and confirmed at St. Peter's.

What teenager enjoys memorizing information or reading texts that were not interesting at the time? It was a treat when Rev. Happel allowed the class to explore through the old attic up into the belfry to see one of the oldest items in the church: the bell (it is _big_). The ladders were tall, hand-made wooden ones which did not seem very stable.

To me the people are the church and at St. Peter's we are friendly, welcoming and willing to help. It is a joy serving together in praising God, helping those in the church and helping others.

My best memory—my wife, Karel, and I met at St. Peter's. Our friendship grew and we were married in the sanctuary on a beautiful June day with many church members present.

We come to St. Peter's to learn more from the Bible and allow our faith to grow. My wife and I had taught Sunday School for many years, and helped our students learn about faith and lessons from the Bible. It is important to be a servant for Christ, helping others by using our talents and other things we have been blessed with. What will people know about us when they watch how we live and serve? Will they come to believe in the Grace that Jesus gives?

Was there anything that happened in your life that may have inspired you to become more involved in church? Around confirmation age I would sit in the back pew with my parents. The services were not interesting to this teenager so they seemed to last a very long time. One Sunday, Mr. Kurth needed another person to help collect the offering. Being in the back pew, it was easy for him to tap me on the shoulder and ask if I would help with the collection. Much more recently, it is an important thing we have done in

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 7:10 PM by President Christine Burman, and began with a prayer from Pastor Chris. The meeting's late start was due to problems initiating

Secretary's Report

The March meeting minutes were sent out a few days after the March meeting, and were approved online by council members. For the record, the minutes were approved again at this meeting.

The importance of reading and acknowledging the minutes as soon as possible after they are sent out was emphasized. This is to allow inclusion in the monthly Key newsletter.

MOTION: TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE MARCH COUNCIL MEETING. MOTION MADE AND SECONDED. MOTION PASSED.

Preschool Report:

Current registration is good, with a few spots still available which is typical for this time of year.

Conferences are next week. The Mother's Day event is coming up in 3 weeks.

A discussion ensued regarding carry-over of sick time for the preschool teachers. They wish to allow carry-over up to a maximum of 28 days. This would provide enough time in the event of extreme emergencies or family situations. It was decided that "PTO time" is the more appropriate wording and the contract will be revised as such.

The cotton candy machine has been received and will be available for use by the whole church.

Water from the recent storm has penetrated one of the class rooms. This may be due to deterioration of the outer sandstone wall, and if so, might be eligible for repair using funds from the grant. It is also possible that leaking window seals are the problem. The matter will be investigated to determine the actual cause.

Treasurer's Report: (Laurie Hubach)

The reports for February and March are combined this month.

A server problem has caused the loss of some yearend data. Most of the data has been manually restored. Compared to 1st Quarter last year: Giving is up almost \$2,000; Building and Property expenses are down almost \$6,000; Ministry in Music is down due to lack of choir director's salary; Office and Support expenses are up slightly. Overall, our financial position is improved over last year for this time period.

Pass-Through expenses are \$210 for One Great Hour of Sharing, and \$125 for OCWM, totalling \$335.

MOTION: TO APPROVE PASS-THROUGH EXPENSES OF \$335. MOTION MADE AND SECONDED. MOTION PASSED.

Met with rep. for office copier in order to reduce cost. Rep will return with proposal. Thanks to all who have participated in improving our financial position – giving is up and expenses are being reduced. Thank you to Geoff Gatz for the addition of the much needed hand rail leading up to the altar. Thank you to Joyce Darakis for the donation of a beautiful wall clock, hand made by her late husband, Arthur. An appropriate location will be determined.

Liam Gleason's Confirmation will tentatively be held on Pentecost Sunday, May 28, which is traditionally the time for Confirmation, and also the birthday of our church.

Looking forward to a summer of good things, more to be announced at a later date.

Compassionate Care: (Joan Whitman)

For Easter nineteen "goodie bags" were filled, and each shut-in received two bags. One bag had edible goodies, and the other had entertainment items. Easter lilies were also given to shut-ins. All were very appreciative of the visits and the gifts.

Altar Guild: (Lynn Hollstein)

Thank you to everyone who helped with the Easter service and the lilies. It all went very well.

Spiritual Life: (Judy McCurdy)

Had good visits today with Audrey Montgomery, and with Don and Jean Swift. All three were in good spirits and appreciative of the visits, and seem to be getting the help and support they need.

Circle Six: (Sally Readinger)

Thank you to Pastor Chris for the entertainment at their anniversary meal. Next meeting is May 2. The program will be "The History of Amherst Quarries" presented by Bob Pallante of the Amherst Historical Society. The program is open to members of St. Peter's and begins at 7 pm.

Ushers: (Al Murphy, Christine Burman)

All is going well. Thank you to our great crew of ushers. The supply of envelopes for the pew pockets is getting low. Becky will include with her order to save on postage. Christine made 5 Visitor packets and has handed out 4, indicating that new people are attending.

Tech Report: (Mary-K Kirsch)

March Tracking report for Zoom: 31 participants viewed the YouTube Minute with Pastor Chris, and 19 participated in the Zoom Sunday service, in addition to those viewing the Sunday service on Facebook.

We would like to replace our Zoom camera. The current one is beginning to show abnormalities in picture quality and focus. In addition, it is a camera best suited for close-up meetings, and was never intended for the longer distances we are using it for.

We recommend investigating whether some of our endowed funds could be used for this purpose, and possibly for other needs. The Library Fund would seem to be a good candidate. Might need an attorney to get a legal opinion on this subject.

The Executive Committee will explore the feasibility of using these endowed funds. Pastor Chris will inquire with some of his colleagues for their opinions.

Garden Team: (Sue Conkle)

Fred and Lynda Helyes applied weed and feed where necessary. Geoff and Linda Gatz mowed the grass using the push mower since the rider currently has a problem. They also did a general cleanup of leaves, dead branches, etc.

Question: Should geraniums be solicited for Pentecost as in past years? Also, please advise on an unsightly tree or overgrown bush along the west side of our parking lot. Not sure whether it belongs to us or to Old Stone Church.

President's Report: (Christine Burman)

The organ has been temporarily repaired.

We are using a borrowed CPU. Our original CPU is being examined to see whether it can be repaired, or whether it will

have to be replaced. After the final repairs are done, the organ will need to be tuned, and several broken keys replaced. Christine is looking for spare keys which we had at one time, and has contacted Pam Schuster who may know their whereabouts. Final costs will not be known until all work has been completed.

There will be a pot luck luncheon April 30, with freewill offering going to the Building Fund. Planning on a movie night sometime close to Mother's Day.

Old Business: (Various)

Discussion of sandstone repair under the north side windows. Out of 7 bids solicited, only 2 have been answered: QPS Chimney Contractors at \$8,400 and Lorain Chimney at \$9,000. The danger of further structural damage forces us to make the decision now.

MOTION: TO ACCEPT THE BID OF \$8,900 FROM QPS CHIMNEY CONTRACTORS. MOTION MADE AND SECONDED. MOTION PASSED.

The walls in Fellowship Hall are in need of repair. The wood has been rotting for quite some time. In some cases, there is direct opening to outside. Shinsky Contractors will examine the damage and give their appraisal and estimate to repair.

Much of the recent grant work (light replacement, ceiling tile, and wiring) has been performed with a major assist in labor from Geoff and Linda Gatz, and Mary K Kirsch. 
