

erhaps you have used this phrase before, "God helps those who help themselves!" One of the scriptures that leads to that quote comes from 2 Thessalonians 3:10, when the Apostle Paul encourages the Christian community to share what they have with the understanding that no one gets a free meal. To paraphrase Paul, "we all have to

work to eat." That's a fair reading and understanding of Paul's thinking and one that doesn't seem to apply to our country as we face an unprecedented surge in mass shootings. I'm writing this in May, following the latest mass shooting in Texas, which is, sadly, becoming a ubiquitous phrase. We have had more mass shootings (where at least 4 or more people are killed by guns) in 2023 than we have had days. Attention! This is not a political issue; this is a survival issue.

One of the arguments that political leaders use to do nothing about gun violence is that we are a Christian nation, and we must put our trust in God. When people say that we need to put our trust in God and allow God to save us from this showering of gun violence, they are missing the point. As Paul suggests in 2 Thessalonians—we must work with God, and for God to accomplish God's will. However, there are times when God acts in our lives

without our effort—such was the case with the crucifixion and the resurrection of Jesus Christ. People rejected and killed Christ, but Godthrough grace—brought him back to life so that all who believe in him shall not perish but have everlasting life! You see, despite our collective actions, <u>God works with and through us</u> to repair and heal the world.

"For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: anyone unwilling to work should not eat."

2 Thessalonians 3:10

We need to allow God to work through us to deal with the gun violence pandemic. If we want to rely on God to help us deal with this explosion of violence and hate in our country, then we all must do something. Doing nothing but offering prayers and lighting candles in memory of those who have been

murdered by weapons manufactured for war, is not a suitable option. As a nation we have struggled through the years to solve issues surrounding race and gender justice. Do you really think that God was fine with segregation, or for that matter-slavery? When Jesus instructed his followers to "Love one another, as I have loved you!" He was telling us all to love, not hate.

GRACE!

"We need God to act, but we need to remain open to how God may be using each of us to bring about the peaceable Kingdom."

We all know the difference between love and hate. In our minds and hearts, we know what God wants. The issue of gun violence is not as complicated as we make it out to be—gun manufacturers are producing more weapons made for war to be sold for public use for their own enrichment. While mental illness is an issue related to gun violence, we are not the only country in the world with a mental illness problem. We have a supply and demand issue. Americans want to purchase rifles like those used on battlefields, and the manufacturers of these weapons are happy to oblige. It's math, the more weapons that can produce massive deaths and casualties (including bullets that can pierce Kevlar) that are sold on the open market—equals more mass shootings.

In Paul's second letter to Thessalonians, he is encouraging all the members of the community to offer their gifts, however generous, so they could share the table meal. We don't all have the same gifts and resources, but we all have our minds and hearts and the ability to allow God to use us. We may think differently when it comes to gun ownership, but we—followers of Christ—are of one heart and mind in Christ.

I'm not trying to solve the issues around our Second Amendment rights, but I'm trying to clarify God's involvement in our lives, especially when it comes to mass shootings. In all honesty, the guns are already out there, we can't put the toothpaste back in the tube. We need God to act, but we need to remain open to how God may be using each of us to bring about the peaceable Kingdom. Grace! God's forgiveness in spite of our actions, or inactions. This is a time for Grace and action!

Remember, you are loved!

JUNE SERMON SCRIPTURE READINGS

6/4 Genesis 1:1-2v4

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day. So God made the dome and separated the waters that were under the dome from the waters that were above the dome. And it was so. God called the dome Sky. And God said, "Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. God called the dry land Earth, and the waters that were gathered together he called Seas. And God saw that it was good. Then God said, "Let the earth put forth vegetation: plants yielding seed, and fruit trees of every kind on earth that bear fruit with the seed in it." And it was so. The earth brought forth vegetation: plants yielding seed of every kind, and trees of every kind bearing fruit with the seed in it. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the third day.

And God said, "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky to separate the day from the night; and let them be for signs and for seasons and for days and years, and let them be lights in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth." And it was so. God made the two great lights—the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night-and the stars. God set them in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth, to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the fourth day. And God said, "Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the dome of the sky." So God created the great sea monsters and every living creature that moves, of every kind, with which the waters swarm, and every winged bird of every kind. And God saw that it was good. God blessed them, saying, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth." And there was evening and there was morning, the fifth day. And God said, "Let the earth bring forth living creatures of every kind: cattle and creeping things and wild animals of the earth of every kind." And it was so. God made the wild animals of the earth of every kind, and the cattle of every kind, and everything that creeps upon the ground of every kind. And God saw that it was good.

Then God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth." So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." God said, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. And to every beast of the earth, and to every bird of the air, and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day. Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their multitude. And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had

done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation. These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created. In the day that the Lord God made the earth and the heavens,

6/11 Genesis 12:1-9

Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

6/18 Genesis 18:1-15

The Lord appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. He looked up and saw three men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them, and bowed down to the ground. He said, "My lord, if I find favor with you, do not pass by your servant. Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree. Let me bring a little bread, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on—since you have come to your servant." So they said, "Do as you have said." And Abraham hastened into the tent to Sarah, and said, "Make ready quickly three measures of choice flour, knead it, and make cakes." Abraham ran to the herd, and took a calf, tender and good, and gave it to the servant, who hastened to prepare it. Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared, and set it before them; and he stood by them under the tree while they ate.

They said to him, "Where is your wife Sarah?" And he said, "There, in the tent." Then one said, "I will surely return to you in due season, and your wife Sarah shall have a son." And Sarah was listening at the tent entrance behind him. Now Abraham and Sarah were old, advanced in age; it had ceased to be with Sarah after the manner of women. So Sarah laughed to herself, saying, "After I have grown old, and my husband is old, shall I have pleasure?" The Lord said to Abraham, "Why did Sarah laugh, and say, 'Shall I indeed bear a child, now that I am old?' Is anything too wonderful for the Lord? Get to Know Your



While many of our longtime members know one another, our newer members do not. We hope this new article will bring us closer together as we serve God as one family.

As most of you know we are fairly new members of St. Peter's. We chose to make this our home church for a variety of reasons, an important one being the warm, welcoming people of this congregation. 
