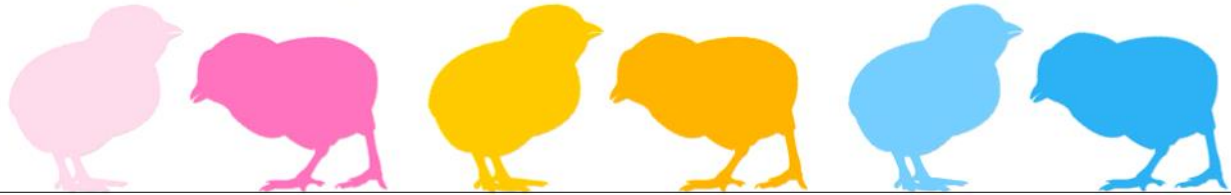

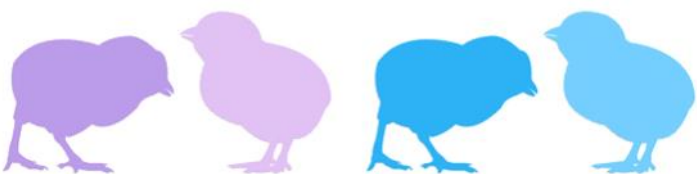
Once heard a story about an "Easter Chicken." A cute little chick was given to a child on Easter. The chick had been dyed some bright color like pink or yellow.

After Easter, when the chick's novelty had worn off, it was tossed into the chicken coop with the rest of the birds. The bigger chickens pecked away mercilessly at the odd, little bird. He didn't even have the good sense to defend himself.

But after a week or two had passed, the Easter Chicken had grown out its feathers to the point that it was beginning to look like the others. And it had begun to join the fray in the coop, giving as good as it got. Soon it was indistinguishable from the rest.

The guy telling the story said the Easter Chicken was like the church. "How so?" I asked. "Well, we started out different but it wasn't long before we were acting just like everyone else —like that Easter chicken."

Whatever else you may think about the words of Jesus above, it's pretty clear that they are seriously at odds with the way the world works. They remind us just how subversive of the world Christianity is.



Most of the time the church, and we who call ourselves “Christian,” are a lot like the Easter Chicken. Our color fades and we play by the same rules as everyone else. It’s hard to tell any real difference.

But the world needs Christians to be different, to not be just the same as everyone else. A good start on that path may be to simply listen to Jesus’ strange words and to let them stand. Resist the impulse to explain them away. Let them haunt you and maybe even change you.

Let us Prayer

Save us, good Lord, from fitting in so damn well. Amen.

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 7:02 PM by President Christine Burman, who began the meeting with a prayer

Secretary's Report: (Tom Hollstein)

- ONE CORRECTION to the February Minutes:
The motion to approve the January minutes has a typo: the year should be 2024, not 2924.

MOTION MADE: TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE FEBRUARY COUNCIL MEETING, WITH CORRECTIONS NOTED. MOTION MADE BY JOAN WHITMAN AND SECONDED BY MARY K KIRSCH. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Preschool Report: (Wendy Kosakowski)

- We are getting ready for Easter.
- The "Hop-a-Thon" will be held next month. Proceeds are used for various charitable programs such as scholarships and the backpack lunch program.
- Enrollment is progressing well.
- A current Treasurer's report is needed so that the Preschool budget can be finished.

Treasurer's Report: (Karel Schieferstein)

- Pass-through to be paid: \$115 for OCWM.

MOTION MADE: TO APPROVE PAYMENT OF \$115 FOR OCWM. MOTION MADE BY GEOFF GATZ AND SECONDED BY STACY GLEASON. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Financial Secretary's Report: (Becky Woods)

- Offering for February was \$9,286.57. This includes Ash Wednesday and some of the Easter Lily sales.

Compassionate Care: (Joan Whitman)

- We are planning activities for May.

Altar Guild: (Lynn Hollstein)

- Easter lilies have been ordered from Pandy's since Petitti's is sold out.
- Altar Guild needs additional members.

Trustee Report: (Geoff Gatz)

- Bids are in process for waxing the floors in Fellowship Hall and the preschool.
- Several outside doors have been repaired by Lakeland Glass.
- Choir room doors have been repaired by Geoff.
- We are seeking advice from Norm Shinsky and Joe Simone, painter, for the repairs to Fellowship Hall. We anticipate bids from these two. Painting will be necessary to hide repairs to the knotty pine paneling.
- Grass mowing season will begin soon.
- A discussion ensued concerning the benefits of a face lift to Fellowship Hall. It was felt that a coordinated effort would be most effective.

Circle Six: (Sally Readinger)

- Circle Six will hold its annual bake sale on Palm Sunday. Anyone can donate baked goods.
- Next meeting will be April 2 at Cole's Public House. It will be the anniversary dinner for members.
- Compliment was given for the recent presentation of Amherst Train Wreck. Would like to see more entertainment activities of similar nature. Circle Six welcomes suggestions for future programs.

Ushers' Report: (Chris Burman for Al Murphy)

- Thank you to the volunteers who have been responding to requests for ushers.

Tech Report: (Mary-K Kirsch)

- We continue to have challenges with different guest ministers, but we are managing.
- Most ministers like the idea of our one-minute online videos.

Fill-In Ministers: (President Christine Burman)

- We have not yet received any prospects for a permanent pastor. We are just one of many churches currently searching for a pastor, and the supply is limited.
- We should be patient and not rush the search process. At present we are doing well with fill-in ministers, both economically and experiencing the variety of styles.
- We are currently using “pulpit supply” from Living Waters Association.
- **Question:** Are we limited to UCC ministers?
- **Answer:** That is really a decision to be made by Council. We can consider ministers outside the UCC if we so wish.
- We must remember that we, the members, are responsible for making our church what it is, and that we direct the pastor, not vice versa. The success of our church depends on us, not the pastor.
- President Christine is spending considerable time finding and scheduling fill-ministers. We thank her for her diligence and hard work.
- **Question:** Could we consider hiring a Lay Pastor?
- **Answer:** It is possible, but it might force us to leave the UCC since technically we are required to hire an ordained minister.
- Consensus discussion was that our church members have pulled together and we are doing well in spite of not having a pastor.

Financial Team: (Mary-K Kirsch)

- Anyone with an account at Schwab can now do a direct transfer donation to St. Peter’s.
- We have received our 2nd gift of \$50,000 and we plan to use it as a gift matching challenge.
- We recommend correcting our kitchen problems so that we can again utilize it fully, possibly as an income source for dinners, fund raisers, etc.
- Natalya of our Ukraine family may wish to stay in the parsonage through the summer.
- **Question:** Will the use of the Schwab transfer result in credit for the donor?
- **Answer:** Yes, the transaction will be visible to our Financial Secretary and credit will be recorded for the donation.

Miscellaneous: (President Christine Burman)

- Financial Secretary Becky Woods has reached her anniversary date. The chair would like to consider a pay raise of 2% in view of her fine performance.

MOTION MADE: MOTION TO GRANT A 2% RAISE TO FINANCIAL SECRETARY BECKY WOODS. MOTION MADE BY GEOFF GATZ AND SECONDED BY DON RAMSEY. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

- Natalya of our Ukraine family wishes to stay in the parsonage through the summer.
- **Question:** Does Council agree to pay utilities for this period?
- **Answer:** Yes, by unanimous acclamation Council will pay the utilities. There is also money in the refugee account that can be used.
- A request was made to resume the men’s breakfasts that were discontinued with the departure of Pastor Chris. Subsequent discussion determined that perhaps this could be merged with the Wednesday morning coffee meetings. This will be investigated further.
- The decision has been made that the upcoming rummage sale will not include a presale. A co-chair for the event is needed to help with planning and administration. Items to be donated should not be brought in until June.

MOTION MADE: MOTION TO ADJOURN MADE BY MARY K KIRSCH AND SECONDED BY KAYE KOLER. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

- The meeting ended at 8:07 PM with a prayer by Christine Burman.

APRIL SERMON SCRIPTURE READINGS

4/7 John 20:19-31

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

4/14 Luke 24:36b-48

While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence. Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer

and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

4/21 John 10:11-18

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

4/28 John 15:1-8

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.

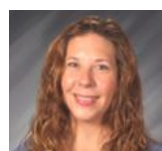

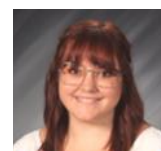

GLIMPSES OF OUR PAST

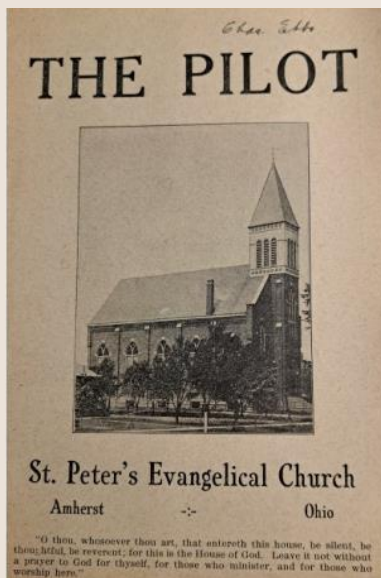

Before "The Key" we had a church publication that was called "The Pilot". It first appeared in August of 1923 and was "devoted to the advancement and interest of" St. Peter's Evangelical Church in Amherst and St. John's Evangelical Church in South Amherst. It was published monthly and was free. Donations to cover expenses were "thankfully received" and "members and friends in business...gladly purchased advertising space..." There were three pages of ads. Members were asked to "kindly visit these business people when they made their purchases and were told that they would find them "reliable and courteous."

The editor of "The Pilot" was the Pastor, E. J. Soell and the Amherst News Company printed 350 copies each month. Inside members found a Church Directory, the monthly schedule for each parish, reports from the church societies, births, marriages and deaths and attendance figures for each service.

Above is a picture of the cover which included a picture of the church and a meditation statement which changed after the first year; and one of the pages of advertising.
